EXECUTIVE TEACHER'S MESSAGE

It is amazing to think that we have passed the half way point of the term. We have had a busy fortnight beginning with our 5/6 students and teachers venturing off to Camp Birrigai for 3 days. The camp provided opportunities to socialise, reinforce problem solving skills, set challenges and conquer them, while developing team-building skills. Big thanks to Lisa Ison for organising a fun-filled camp, and the 5/6 teachers and Birrigai staff who made it such a huge success. Mrs Ison has already booked us in for next year!

In recognition of Reconciliation and National Sorry Day last week, Giralang Primary School took part in the theme of *Don't Keep History a Mystery: Learn. Share. Grow.* Our key school focus was 'Yarning Circles'. Yarning Circles have been used by Aboriginal people for thousands of years to discuss important issues in an inclusive and collaborative way, as well as creating a non-hierarchical environment for conversations. Our aim was to gather students' voices as a part of our Reconciliation journey, to learn more about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures, and develop a deeper understanding of our national story.

Via these Yarning Circles, students had the opportunity to respond as a class as the teachers facilitated conversations using the questions:

- What are you thinking?
- How are you feeling?
- What do you bring to this circle?

We are now looking forward to celebrating NAIDOC Week. This year's theme is "Because of her, we can". We have invited Veronica Jordan, a Kalkadoon woman, in to share some traditional knowledge workshops with our students. These workshops will include discussion about how important Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women are in our communities and the workshop will also include basket weaving and doll making.

GOOGLE COMMUNITIES +1, COMMENT, AND REPLY

Each week, teachers endeavour to share the learning and fun happenings in their class with you via our Google Community. You will receive an email notification when something new is posted on the community page. It is a private page that only teachers from the school and parents from the class have access to. We would love to see community members share thoughts, ideas and wonderings about the content via the class communities themselves. Our goal is to have more parent/family input around teaching and learning. There are three ways to participate in conversations by leaving comments and +1'ing posts:



- Clicking the +1. This 'likes' a post, comment or reply;
- Clicking the comment box to a post displays below the original post; and
- Replying to a comment which will insert the name of the person to which you are replying at the beginning of a response.

NATIONAL CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA (NCCD)

In 2018, all schools will take part in the National Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD). This project collects the number of students who require adjustments to participate in education. This data presents a picture of the support provided for each student, with the focus on assisting government to target support and resources in schools to help all students reach their potential.

If your child requires some additional support at school, they may be included in the data collection. Some examples of adjustments at school may include small group literacy and numeracy sessions, use of specialised equipment, additional time to complete tasks, modification of assessment tasks, or class work.

A significant change which has occurred in recent years is that parents do not need to provide consent for the data collection, however they are provided with the opportunity to withdraw their consent. All parents will be given the opportunity to do this. If you have any questions regarding this process please do not hesitate to email me:

News from 3H Dominoes and 3K Rubik's Cubes



3H have been participating in debates, verbal expositions and role plays to support them to draw simple conclusions based on information and data presented. It has helped them to respectfully interact with others and encouraged them to share points of view in an appropriate manner. Students reflect on learning to propose actions in response to an issue or challenge and consider possible effects of proposed actions. An example of this was when students were given a topic based around a family farm and a new road that needed to be introduced through that farm and students were given the side that they had to argue for. The reasons and evidence provided were most impressive and it helped students see that there is almost always two sides to every story.

3K have been exploring Democracy and how to make decisions using democratic processes. Students are discussing the benefits of living in a democratic society and were surprised at how long it took Australia to allow women and Indigenous Australians the right to vote. Students are learning the value of their vote and how they can contribute to their community in positive ways. Students are writing their own policies and campaign slogans in order to convince their peers that they should be Prime Minister of 3K. Voting booths will open soon. We will let you know who our new Prime Minister will be.

In Maths, we have been learning about measurement using formal units including centimetres and metres. Students explored a range of different objects and were required to measure their length and height.



3H Dominoes have been busy rehearsing and presenting their Readers' Theatre plays to the class. Students formed small groups and practised their fluency, expression and confidence when reading aloud.



Students in 3K are enjoying creating and writing simple, complex and compound sentences. They identify the subject, verbs and conjunctions. They have also become experts in identifying and independently spelling words with prefixes and suffixes.



Congratulations to all the students who have been brave enough to stand in front of the class and present their Rostrum speeches. The standard has been outstanding and they have all been so different! Your teachers are very proud of your efforts!
